### Collection Development Selection

- Follow policy
- Review sources
- Community need
- Order monthly
- Budget for bigger orders (i.e.: holiday)
- Jobbers benefits and technical processing

## Handling Challenges

- Make no promises!
- Apologize for how they feel but not the library's decision
- Listen to the full complaint
- Redirect
- Use selection guidelines language
